2020/21 – quite the year and one for the record books! Total Club membership reached 1222, more than twice the previous season, and well above a peak of 860 that we reached in 2013/14. Welcome to all 515 new members, we hope that you enjoyed the trails and will be back this year. Thanks to all that renewed their membership, 87% compared to our normal renewal rate of 50-60%. In terms of trends, we saw the percentage of those under 50 increase a bit, as well as those from outside the Castlegar area. My thanks to our local partners that collect registrations and distribute badges: Mallard's Source for Sports in Castlegar, Gerick Sports in Trail and Powderhound in Rossland. As always, we would like to improve the registration process – let us know if you have any suggestions.

Viking Centre, Shelters and Covid-19

As shown in 2020/2021, the exceptional cooperation by the Club Executive, volunteers, trail groomers, Club members and visitors made for an open and wonderful ski season. The BC "Return to Sport" safety plan gave critical guidance as to the steps needed to continue operations. The demands of keeping everyone safe under challenging circumstances were met, and the importance

of our cherished Nordic skiing activity was highlighted resulting in the busiest season we have ever had!

Requirements for the continued operations of the Paulson XC Ski Trails are very similar to last year. The details can be reviewed on the CNSC website at: https://www.castlegarnordic.ca/covid-19-safety-plan/

In a nutshell, the following guidance will need to be followed:

- Stick to the well-known physical distancing rules: 2 meters.
- Sign in at the Glenmerry and Viking trail heads.
- Follow the flow pattern and entry/exit doors at the Viking Centre.
- Wear a mask when entering the Viking Centre and when interacting with others.
- The maximum capacity of Viking is 17. Stay within one of three marked areas with your family or "bubble" when you are there to eat or warm up. Limit your stay so others can have a turn.
- By calculation, the trail shelters have a maximum capacity of 11 but, in reality, skiers want to cluster around the wood stove. Given distancing needs, it is reasonable to limit occupancy in all the shelters to 8 skiers.
- Keep your personal bags, equipment and supplies in your car, not in the Clubhouse.
- Thank a volunteer!

We are all looking forward to an excellent ski year once again! Happy trails!

Fee Collections and Cabin Wardens

Castlegar Nordic Ski Club is a non-profit organization that relies on volunteers to provide an exceptional ski experience to our membership and guests. Volunteer fee collection is critical in meeting our costs and keeping our membership fees low. As we did last year, to ensure we have coverage during peak times at both trailhead entrances, the volunteer shifts will be 10am to 2pm. If a member or guest volunteers for 4 days or more, they will receive a <u>free ski pass</u> for the following ski season.



Our cabins are also a key part of the excellent skiing experience provided to our membership and guests. Many volunteer hours are given to prepare the cabins for the upcoming season. Thank you to those who came out this past season and in previous years. To ensure our cabins and outhouses are maintained throughout the season, we are continuing our cabin warden program. This involves keeping the cabin and outhouse clean and well stocked throughout the season. For the most part, it is a once-a-week process. Wardens can be individuals, family groups, friend groups etc. A kit is provided, and it is a fairly simple process. Personal masks, gloves, and sanitizing supplies are provided.

Trails and Infrastructure Report

A grant from Columbia Basin Trust has allowed the Club to continue with our plans to upgrade our infrastructure and sections of the trail system.

On the eastern section of the trail system, 8 kms of trails have been upgraded. Brush has been removed on the east section of Rossland/Paulson. Major upgrades to the trail surface including brush removal have been completed on sections of Gloryview and Ivar trails. The majority of work was carried out on the Norwegian Trail northeast of Glenmerry Shelter. This included the rebuilding and widening of the trail surface. Grass seeding is still to be completed.

Funding was also received for the removal and replacement of the old wooden bridge on the Mud Lake meadow. A steel bridge has been purchased and installation is expected this fall providing that weather conditions are favourable, and machines are available.

The Sentinel Unit Crew from the BC Wildfire Service was onsite this year and used the area for training the crew in the use of chain saws. This resulted in a number of snags being felled throughout the trail system and cut for firewood which is a great benefit to the Club.


BC Timber Sales has graded 13 km's of roads in the western section of the ski trails this summer. Grading of these roads has resulted in a significant amount of brush being removed and the widening of the road surface in some areas. This will reduce the amount of brushing required over the next few years.

Finally, the Club hopes to complete some widening and improvements to the highway access road junctions into the Mud Lake parking lot before the snow flies, again contingent on equipment availability.


